	PLENARY: Targeted Rapid PrEP: Impact and Lessons Learned  New South Wales was the first state in Australia to trial PrEP at a large scale. The high-level, targeted, rapid roll-out of PrEP led to a 35% decline in state-wide HIV diagnoses in MSM, and a 44% decline in early HIV infections in MSM in less than one year. Why was this approach so successful? What were the key take away messages? What can Ontario learn from Australia's experience?
