It has been a tremendous year of growth, renewed enthusiasm, and new directions for the OHTN!

It is a real privilege and honour for me to step into this new leadership role at the OHTN. Taking over for Dr. Jay Browne is a hard act to follow. Jay was instrumental in the formation of the OHTN with its mission and vision to improve the lives of people with HIV in Ontario. I am committed to realizing the potential of the OHTN to make a significant difference in the fight against HIV and AIDS.

The most significant advancement at the OHTN this year was the development of a new Strategic Plan to 2010 entitled *Advancing HIV Policy and Care Through a Network of Excellence*. With the leadership of the Board of Directors, we have shaped this new

plan so that we evolve and address the emerging trends of the epidemic while meeting the changing needs of all of our stakeholders. Some of the exciting new initiatives in our new strategy are to: (1) increase the number and capacity of HIV health care providers in the field; (2) support efforts to address the determinants of health through building capacity in scientifically rigorous community-based research; (3) invest in research that will have an impact on care and policy today; (4) support the development of innovative and effective eHealth technologies to improve the health of people with HIV; (5) enhance and sustain the OHTN Cohort Study to inform care and treatment decisions; (6) support knowledge transfer and exchange expertise; and (7) monitor and evaluate all OHTN activities to ensure that we have clear targets to measure our outcomes. These are just some of the highlights. I encourage you to take the time to read our new Strategic Plan to 2010 for more of the details.

As we embark together on these new directions and initiatives, I am confident that with our commitment, energy and expertise in Ontario, our work and the impact we will have for people with HIV will reach beyond the boundaries of our province.


